Sister Marguerite Bambic was born in Joliet, Illinois on January 30, 1910 to Joseph and Teresa Klun Bambic. On February 13 she was baptized Mary at St. Joseph Church in Joliet. Mary was the second youngest of six children, with three brothers: Joseph, Frank and Anton, and two sisters: Theresa and Angela. When Mary was sixteen years old, she came to St. Francis Convent to become a postulant. The following August 12, 1927, Mary received the Franciscan habit and the new name of Sister M. Marguerite.

Following first profession of vows on August 12, 1929, Sister Marguerite began her energetic ministry of teaching and elementary administration which would last for over 50 years. Her ministry took her to four states and many schools during those years. Her students admired her unique ways of motivating them to learn. Many of these students and their parents kept in contact with Sister Marguerite for many years. Sister Marguerite took great pride in being well prepared for any duty she performed and her classes were evidence of that. Some of her extracurricular activities included training altar boys and supervising the school student crossing guards. Sister Marguerite enjoyed directing pageants to help the students have a better understanding of history. Perhaps her own studies in the field of history guided her, for her baccalaureate thesis had been on the subject of medieval castles.

After her days of full-time ministry in education were completed, Sister Marguerite continued to serve as a substitute teacher while she lived at the Motherhouse in Joliet. She also volunteered her time for tutoring. She liked to sew, work crossword puzzles and enjoyed reading books on various subjects.

In 1996, Sister Marguerite retired at Our Lady of Angels in Joliet. As she reflected on the gift of her life, she was filled with gratitude. She was appreciative of the care and service she received and for the family and friends who visited and wrote to her. Always, she was grateful for the gift of her religious vocation and appreciated the inspiration her mother had been for her in her youth.

As her condition grew more frail, Sister Marguerite spent her time in quiet prayer. While members of her family and some of the Sisters gathered at her bedside on December 13, 1998, Sister Marguerite peacefully drew her last breath and experienced fully the meaning of the Advent refrain that was softly sung, "Come, Lord, Jesus..."

Sister Marguerite, we thank you for your love and dedication to spreading the good news through your teaching and your life. Pray for us, your relatives, friends and Franciscan family, that we may hear God's word and keep it.
