## Sister Nicolette Galik, OSF

Sister Nicolette Galik was born on September 19, 1902, to the late Victoria and Andrew Galik in Orbisonia, Pennsylvania. Baptized Catherine at St. Mary Church in Shade Valley, Pennsylvania, she was one of seven children born to these Slovak immigrants from Austria-Hungary. She was preceded in death by her siblings: her brother Andrew, and five sisters, Sophie, Ann, Verne, Victoria and Mary. She is survived by nieces and nephews.

Catherine entered our Congregation on August 14, 1919, and professed first vows on August 12, 1922. Sister Nicolette made her perpetual profession on August 12, 1925. Her early superiors, who believed she had a vocation to the religious life, could not have known that she would celebrate nearly 85 years of religious life with her Joliet Franciscan Sisters.

Sr. Nicolette attended St. Stephen School in Johnstown, Pennsylvania. She graduated from St. Francis Academy and earned a bachelor's degree in history from the College of St. Francis in Joliet.

Nicolette began her seven-decade career in education in 1922. During this long span of time, she taught every elementary school grade in 13 different schools. Her assignments read like a Joliet Franciscan atlas: in Illinois - Chicago, Des Plaines, Streator, Joliet; in Wisconsin - Red Cliff; in Ohio - Cleveland and Columbus. After retiring from full time teaching in 1969, she continued part time teaching and library work at St. Joseph School in Joliet. From 1975 to 1991, Sr. Nicolette ministered as a tutor in the St. Francis Reading Center at our Motherhouse.

Many of us remember Sr. Nicolette for another ministry she performed on behalf of our Sisters, college students and neighbors who enjoyed our Motherhouse grounds. Every spring, summer and fall found Sr. Nicolette tending the roses along the campus walkways and in the Motherhouse garden. We can picture her in her gardening apron, tools and pail in hand, pruning, feeding, cutting and covering those beautiful



roses, which were never the same once Nicolette retired to Our Lady of Angels. Perhaps her longevity was aided by knowing how to balance work and recreation. In addition to her gardening, she loved to sew and was a great lover of nature's many beauties.

From her earliest years, Sr. Nicolette was a quiet but deep woman. A few people knew her well, but even those who lived with her for many years can attest to her reluctance to talk about herself. Yet she enjoyed the companionship of community. She once wrote that she enjoyed living in a community with "young and old mixed. Young have much to learn from the wisdom and experience of the old, and the old need the young blood to give them life, vigor and enthusiasm, which decline with old age. We don't want to be old grumpy people living with grumpy people." And despite her age, we all saw her enthusiasm on her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday when she could still be delighted by a gathering of friends and a box of Fannie May chocolates.

We can tell much about people, if not from their own words, from the words they cherish. Nicolette had the practice of clipping articles, prayers, Dear Abby columns, inspirational writings (in both English and Slovak) so that she could reread the wisdom they contained. She kept a little black book of quotes, notes from spiritual talks and thoughts for the day which she wanted to revisit. One of her little notes sums up a life well-lived, a life worth living long: "If you want to be a saint, just be kind." We pray in gratitude for the kindnesses Sr. Nicolette shared with us for so very many years. We know that she is rejoicing with her family members and sisters in heaven, where she is young again. We know that she is resting in peace with her good God. Amen! Alleluia!
