## For those who have been faithful, O Lord, life is not ended, but merely changed.

Sister M. Mercia Gillivan was born in Columbus, Ohio to John and Abbie Cady Gillivan, the third of six children, preceded by Robert and John and followed by Edward, Mary Catherine and James. Baptized at St. Patrick Church in Columbus, she was given the name Anna Louise, but was always called Louise. Louise attended Holy Cross and St. John's Elementary Schools in Columbus followed by commercial school at Sacred Heart.

On September 8, 1936, after experiencing the death of both parents, Louise became a postulant with the Franciscan Sisters in Joliet. The following August 12, Louise was received into the novitiate and was given the name, Sister M. Mercia. Following first profession, Sister Mercia continued her studies at the College of St. Francis, graduating cum laude as an English major four years later.

In the fall of 1941 Sister Mercia began her ministry of secondary education at St. Francis Academy, where she taught for many years. Summers were often spent working in the office of the principal, then Sister Borromeo. The students there have fond memories of Sister Mercia as a senior class moderator, director of the annual senior play, moderator of the school paper and as an English teacher who exposed them to Shakespeare and to all forms of poetry including "The Ballad of the White Horse" and "The Hound of Heaven".

From 1962-1968 Sister Mercia served as General Secretary for the Congregation during Mother Borromeo's second term of office as General Superior. Sister Mercia's giftedness with language led her to chronicle many of the events during that administration.

In 1970 Sister Mercia began another form of ministry, working in an adult education program, founded by Mother Borromeo Mack, at the Peter Claver Center in Joliet, which later moved to the East Wing of St. Francis Academy. In these classrooms gathered a mini United Nations, with students from Laos, Viet Nam, Czechoslovakia, Mexico, Poland, the Philippines and many other places. The students were eager to learn English, to obtain a High School Diploma and to study for the citizenship exam.

In 1970 Sister Mercia moved to Our Lady of Angels where she continued her ministry of adult education. Mother Borromeo's death in 1987 was a sad event that had a profound effect on Sister Mercia. October 21st marked the 10th anniversary of that passing.

Several days later, on October 23rd, as the Sisters were leaving the chapel after the 7:30 a.m. Mass and with several sisters praying at her bedside, Sister Mercia gave her soul back to God.

Sister Mercia, we thank you for the gift of your life. We ask that you continue to pray for us, your Franciscan sisters, your relatives, your friends and former students. May you know the joy of God's loving presence forever. Amen. Alleluia.
