Sister Anna Marie Simon was born in Crystal Lake, Illinois on July 28, 1913 to Edward and Amanda Simon. She was baptized on August 10 of that same year at St. Thomas Church in Crystal Lake. She attended grammar school in Crystal Lake and received her First Holy Communion and the sacrament of Confirmation at St. Thomas Parish.

At age 16, Anna Marie became a postulant with the Franciscan Sisters in Joliet. Her pastor, Father Edwin McCormick wrote these words about her in a letter dated June 10, 1929: "Anna Marie Simon is a very pious young lady and I take great pleasure in recommending her." When Anna Marie was received into the Novitiate on August 12, 1930, she was given the name Sister Patricia. In a letter to Mother Thomasine, requesting to make vows, Sister Patricia expressed her appreciation for the Congregation and her desire to live as a Franciscan Sister. She wrote: "In appreciation and gratitude to the community, I wish to thank you, Mother, for the two years of Novitiate and the beautiful instruction on religious life." The following August 12, Sister Patricia pronounced her vows and continued her life of dedication and service for over 60 years.

Her first assignment was in Manhattan, Illinois where she did domestic work to help the Sisters who were teaching at St. Joseph Parish. Sister Rose Angela recognized her as a "very fine cook." After five years of service in Manhattan, Sister Patricia went to St. Mary's in Rock Island, Illinois, to help the Sisters there. Sister Patricia suffered much in her life because of poor health, but continued to be of service to her Sisters in various convents in Illinois and Ohio.

In 1962 Sister Patricia came to Our Lady of Angels Retirement Home where she was active in crafts, sewing and activity events. She prayed daily for the needs of the world. When given the option, Sister Patricia went back to using her baptismal name of Sister Anna Marie.

On June 13, 1992 Sister Anna Marie joined with her classmates and other Jubilarians as she celebrated her Diamond Jubilee marking 60 years of religious service.

Following a recent fall, Sister Anna Marie was hospitalized at St. Joseph Medical Center in Joliet. As her strength failed even more, she communicated mainly with a smile. On April 27, as the nursing staff was assisting her, she quietly breathed her last, going peacefully to meet her God.

Sister Anna Marie, we thank you for the gift of your life and prayer among us. We thank you for your support of prayer and the many ways that you gave of yourself to help others. May you now be welcomed to

God's heavenly mansion, where you will know no more pain or suffering. May you continue to pray for us, your family, and your Franciscan Sisters. May you live in God's peace forever. Amen. Alleluia.
