Dear Sisters and Associates,

In the response to the first reading of the Mass of Resurrection tonight, we sing "My soul doth glory in your love, O Lord." This might well have been the motto for Sister Lydia Scheiblich's life - she gloried in the gift of life and shared that joy with countless people whose lives she touched.

Her whole life in the Congregation was devoted to the service of God's people, principally through her work in the Catholic school systems of Ohio and Illinois. Her love of children was extraordinary, and she had that special quality of inspiring them to do their best in her classes. Sister Lydia was especially effective with junior high students instilling into their impressionable young minds the Christian Franciscan values that she lived daily.

As an educator and principal, Sister Lydia was highly respected and appreciated by the Sisters who worked with her as well. One sister with her in Worthington as a beginning teacher described her as "very forward in her thinking - willing to allow new things in the classroom, provided you had the discipline."

When she came to the Motherhouse in 1976, Sister had completed fifty—three years of educational ministry, thirty—three of those years as superior and principal. She then tutored for five additional years until mobility became difficult because of the severe degenerative arthritis that had been so present in her life for so many years. That pain was a part of Sister Lydia's life until her last conscious moment.

She leaves on earth her many friends, but none will miss her more than her beloved sister, Sister Evelyn. To Sister Evelyn, their sister Mrs. Evelyn Heise, their Joliet Franciscan niece, Sister Rita Greene and their many other nieces, nephews and family members, we offer our sympathy and. prayerful support.

As Sister Lydia now celebrates the joy of Resurrection, we recall her presence among us with gratitude. We are appreciative of all she did for the Congregation, and for the many lives she touched. May the Lord whom she served so generously reward her with the joy of His Presence forever.
